Opening Summary

On this beautiful Mother’s Day morning, Tiffany closed out the series by bringing together the heart of surrender, identity, faith, and spiritual influence through the Hebrew words **IMA** and **AK**. She reminded the SisStars that *IMA* speaks to the nurturing, covering, wise, compassionate, spiritually influential nature that women carry — whether they have birthed children biologically or have mothered through prayer, mentoring, love, leadership, and presence. Then she introduced *AK* as a word of emphasis and declaration — a deep, inner knowing that says **surely**. Anchored in **Psalm 23**, Tiffany taught that a surrendered woman carries a fragrance, leaves an impact, and walks with a “surely” in her spirit because she knows that God’s goodness and mercy are following her, even in loss, hardship, uncertainty, and valley seasons.

Speaker Voice Recap | Tiffany

Good morning, good morning everyone, and **Happy Mother’s Day** to everyone. Tiffany opened by acknowledging the beauty of the morning and then quickly moved into the Word because, as she said, everybody had places to go, people to see, and things to do.

She said today’s lesson would wrap up and close out what had been taught over the previous weeks, and the focus would be on two Hebrew words:

IMA — I-M-A

AK — A-H-K

And the title was:

The Power of Surely

Tiffany explained that **IMA** is the Hebrew word commonly used for **mother**, but she expanded it beyond biology. She said it reflects:

nurturing • covering • wisdom • compassion • spiritual influence

She made it clear that *IMA* does not only describe a woman who has birthed children. It describes a woman who carries the ability to cover, pour into, guide, nurture, and spiritually influence others.

“I believe every single one of us as women possess this nature.”

Then she explained **AK** as a Hebrew word connected to breath, emphasis, and declaration — something you say because you know it deep down in your spirit.

So when those two ideas come together, Tiffany said:

“A woman who carries and nurtures still has the power to declare surely.”

Psalm 23: The Surely Declaration

Tiffany took the SisStars to **Psalm 23:1–6**, reading the full passage and then placing the focus on verse 6:

“Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life...”

She reminded us that **surely** does not mean maybe. It does not mean sometimes. It is not uncertain language.

It is a declaration.

It is a knowing.

It is the woman of God saying:

“I know what God has been. I know what God is. And I’m declaring what He will continue to be.”

The Fragrance We Leave Behind

Tiffany gave a beautiful picture of someone walking into a room smelling amazing — and even after they leave, their fragrance still lingers.

She said that is how we are as women of God.

We carry a scent.

We leave evidence.

We leave something behind.

She asked the SisStars to consider:

“What fragrance am I leaving when I leave a room?”

And then she connected it to spiritual impact:

- What do people feel after they’ve been around me?
- What does my presence leave behind?

- Is my influence nurturing?
- Is my fragrance one of compassion, wisdom, leadership, love, and spiritual strength?

Tiffany said some women may not have had good biological mother experiences, but God still placed women in their lives whose fragrance remained through words, encouragement, wisdom, compassion, leadership, presence, and love.

■ Connecting Back to the Series

Tiffany reminded everyone of the flow of the past weeks.

First, they talked about **locked doors** — the places we keep closed off from God, the places we do not want God or anyone else to see.

Then they talked about **surrender** — what happens when we finally release what we have been holding onto and let God have His way.

Then she said that if we are going to be surrendered women, if we are inviting God into the spiritual house of our lives, then we also have to make room for Him to **dwell**.

That means getting rid of:

our itinerary • our plans • our control • our own way

She said this series has been about activating our faith and no longer putting God into certain categories or rooms, but allowing Him to live, move, and rule in every part of our everyday lives.

🔥 Point 1: Surely Is Confidence in God

Tiffany taught that when David said **surely**, he was speaking from a place of confidence in God.

David had already declared:

- The Lord is my Shepherd
- He leads me
- He restores me
- He guides me

- He comforts me
- He prepares a table
- He anoints my head
- My cup overflows

And then David says:

“Surely...”

Tiffany reminded us that David had been through real life. He had fought lions. He had faced betrayal. He had run for his life. He had made mistakes. He had sinned. He had gone through valley experiences.

But after all of that, he still declared:

“Surely.”

Tiffany said David was essentially saying:

“I know what I have been through. I know the hardships I’ve faced. I know what God has brought me through. And without a shadow of a doubt, I still trust Him.”

She told the SisStars that a surrendered woman may bend under pressure, but she does not break because she has a **surely**.

Then she asked:

“What is trying to steal your surely today?”

Is it the past?

Is it worry?

Is it fear?

Is it tomorrow?

Is it what you cannot change?

She said we have to have a **surely in our spirit**.

Point 2: Every Woman Carries the Ability to Nurture and Give Life

Tiffany then moved into the nurturing nature of women, reminding us that we do not have to be biological mothers to be nurturers.

She brought in:

Proverbs 31:26 — “She openeth her mouth with wisdom; and in her tongue is the law of kindness.”

She said motherhood is bigger than biology.

Women can mother through:

mentoring • praying • encouraging • guiding • protecting • covering • speaking life

Then Tiffany gave a deeply personal testimony about **SisStar Terrie D** and how she came to her in love when Tiffany was preparing for Tiana’s spinal fusion surgery.

Terrie D told Tiffany that she would be praying for her, but she also told her to lay hands on her child every day and pray over her. Tiffany said Terrie D gave her the prompting and prayer she needed, and then promised:

“As you are praying this over your child, I’m going to be praying this over you.”

Tiffany testified that because of God and the prayers of the SisStarhood:

“Today, my daughter is not paralyzed. She is not in a wheelchair. This little girl is walking, talking, moving, and still free to do things.”

That was an IMA moment.

A covering moment.

A SisStarhood moment.

She said:

“We are IMAs for one another.”

There is comfort in knowing that when one sister cannot do it alone, there is a sisterhood lifting her, praying her through, and carrying her to the other side.

Why This Space Matters

Tiffany reminded us that Dr. Dye had taught about sisterhood, covering, and why this space is holy.

She said how we show up matters.

Our faith matters.

Our personal walk matters.

Our fragrance matters.

“We can’t all be out here living one way and doing something else.”

Roxy says it all the time:

“We don’t have time to play about this.”

Tiffany said the world will try to tell us we are not worthy because of our mistakes, our past, our relationships, our choices, or our circumstances.

But God says:

“You are beautifully and wonderfully made.”

“You are uniquely made.”

“I know the number of hairs on your head.”

“I know what I have planned and prepared for you.”

And that is why our IMA spirit must come alive.

That is why our fragrance must be checked.

That is why our influence must be intentional.

Goodness and Mercy Are Still Following

Tiffany acknowledged that Mother’s Day can be hard.

Some mothers are gone.

Some children are gone.

Some women are grieving.

Some are trying to figure out their new space in life.

Some have lost loved ones, jobs, finances, identity, or stability.

She said:

“Life is life.”

But then she brought the SisStars back to **Romans 8:28**:

“All things work together for the good.”

She reminded us that it does not mean everything feels good, but it is working for the good — completing us, folding us, forming us.

Then she returned to David’s declaration:

“Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me...”

Not condemnation.

Not shame.

Not failure.

Not the past.

Goodness and mercy.

She said even when we cannot see it, God is still moving behind us. Even when we feel collapsed emotionally, mercy is following. Even when we feel like we have lost our mind, goodness is following.

The Surely Woman

Tiffany said we need to rise up with an **AK** in our spirit — a surely declaration.

A surely when life comes over us.

A surely when things are not going well.

A surely even when things are going well.

She reminded us that comfort still belongs to us because the Comforter still wants to comfort us.

She said God wants us to remember:

“Surely I am still with you.”

“Surely I still have purpose for you.”

“Surely your life still matters.”

“Surely this season is not meant to destroy you.”

“Surely goodness is still with you.”

Then she declared that what makes women powerful is not that we have never suffered — it is that we have suffered and still believe.

“A woman who has cried still believes.”

A woman who has lost things can still worship.

A woman who is tired can still give.

A woman walking through the valley can still expect goodness.

Tiffany said:

“This kind of woman, who has a surely in her pocket and a surely on her mouth, is dangerous for the enemy.”

The enemy wants to disrupt us because he knows if we speak our **surely**, we will overcome.

23. From there, she tied the entire series together — locked doors, surrender, dwelling, faith activation, and spiritual fragrance — reminding the SisStars that a woman of God does not just exist in the room; she leaves something behind. Her presence, prayer, wisdom, and faith should carry the scent of goodness, mercy, and assurance in God.

Tiffany closed this series by reminding every SisStar that she carries more than her pain, more than her past, and more than her circumstances — she carries influence, covering, wisdom, compassion, and a spiritual fragrance that lingers. Whether Mother’s Day was joyful, heavy, complicated, or tender, the word remained the same: **surely goodness and mercy are still following us**. The call was to stop living guarded, stop letting the enemy steal our declaration, and stop acting as if we do not have blessed assurance. We are women with a surely in our hearts and on our mouths. We are IMAs for one another. We nurture, cover, pray, mentor, influence, and rise. And because God has been faithful before, we can declare today with confidence: **Surely God is with me. Surely I am loved. Surely I am covered. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life.**
