II. Kinds of Prayer

- 1) **Supplication:** To ask humbly and earnestly; an entreaty; to kneel; to seek or ask for by humble entreaty; to submissively pray.

- 2) **Prayer (proseuche):** Prayer in general; to request; to ask;

I Thess. 5:17

- 3) **Prayer (deesis/supplication):** A much stronger word, which stresses a need; a sense of urgency; shows agony;

- 4) **Intercession:** A petition on behalf of others; meeting with God to offer a plea for another.

- 5) **Gratitude:** Giving of thanks; thankfulness; this is a prayer of thanksgiving, and not to request or ask for anything from God. Strictly - "God, I THANK You."

III. Biblical Background (Various forms and usages of the word "Pray")

A. PRAY (PALAL):

- 1) to ask earnestly, humbly or supplicatingly; to beseech; to make a devout petition to God or man;
- 2) to enter into spiritual communion with God; to give praise and thanks;
- 3) to ask or request; an early word used as a request or to beseech;

Petition to man

Petition to God (The first usage of this word PALAL as communication with God is in Genesis 20:7)

B. PRAYS/PRAYING

(The word "prays" is not found in the Bible; however, the present perfect tense "praying" is.) The meaning of this word is "supplication or entreaty."

I Samuel 1:12

C. PRAYED (PALAL)

(This word is the past perfect tense of the word (palal).

D. PRAYER (When used as a noun)

Hebrew: T'PHILLAH (Old Testament)

Greek: PROSEUCHE (New Testament)

The meaning of both of these words is "intercession or hymn." The most common usage of "T'PHILLAH" in the Old Testament is "intercession":

II Chronicles 7:15

Psalms 72:15

Psalms 109:4

Proverbs 15:8

In the New Testament, the most common usage is "PROSEUCHE" and it has four meanings:

- 1) An address to God
- 2) To pray earnestly
- 3) A place set apart for the offering of prayer
- 4) A set order of words to be prayed

St. Matthew 21:13 shows the usage of #3:

Other meanings:

St. Matthew 21:22: #2

St. Luke 6:12: #3 and #2

Acts 16:13: #3

PRAYER (DE-ESIS): Another usage of the word "prayer" in the New Testament.

- 1) need
- 2) want
- 3) penury (extreme poverty)
- 4) indigence (needy, impoverished)

This word is used four times:

St. Luke 1:13
 Romans 10:1
 II Corinthians 1:11
 II Corinthians 9:14

PRAYER (EUCHE): a vow or prayer:

Acts 21:23 (vow/euche)
 James 5:15 (prayer/euche))
 I Peter 4:7 (prayer/euche)

(I Peter 4:7 is the last mention of the word "prayer")

E. PRAYERS (plural)

Hebrew: "T'PHILLAH" (Old Testament)

Greek: "PROSEUCHOMAI" (New Testament)
